# **Connecting with Daryl Mack**

Daryl has many interests and passions that point back to his childhood and young adult years. The interweaving of his skills and experiences has given him a fulfilling and satisfying life.

Daryl's current position driving truck for Ten Thousand Villages follows his other experiences in trucking, first with MCC and the Material Resource Center, followed by three years on the road with the meat canner.

The years with the meat canner took Daryl to ten states and opened his eves to this work of MCC as well as the opportunity to make many friends who hosted him in their homes. During these summers, Daryl helped with the fruit-drying project in Reedley, California.

Daryl's childhood and youth on the farm were filled with activity: work as well as play. He loved to climb trees, even silos. In fact Daryl climbed his

first silo at age four. Also during these years he became aware of his love for animals.

Born in Montgomery County, Daryl moved with his family to Vermont for two of his early childhood years. His parents, Abram and Lois Mack represented Franconia Mennonite Conference as they assisted at Bartonsville Mennonite Church. Daryl has vivid memories of a anther and a mountain lion running through their fields.

The Mack family was a musical family and they often sang together. Social life was spent with extended family. Life was simple and gave Daryl roots to grow.

When the family moved back home, they were on a small dairy farm near Valley Forge. The final move was to the farm where Abram grew up, the homestead. Daryl was involved in the farm work from age ten.

He came back to work fulltime on the farm after his graduation from LMH. He was assigned to the Jersey milk processing plant, learning to process milk and mainly to make ice cream for the farm store. It was here that he learned the skill of making the best hand cranked ice cream that he generously shares with friends to this day.


When the farm store went out of business in 1983, the doors of opportunity opened for Daryl. He was ready to explore new places and develop new skills.

He first took advantage of this time to fly with his brother to southern Africa to visit his sister Donna and Jim Shenk who were serving there with MCC. Daryl and his brother spent time in Europe on the way home, visiting friends.

Later Daryl returned to Europe on a two-week skiing trip to Italy and Austria. Next he signed up for service proiects in Haiti.

The summer of 1988 found Daryl joining MCC for a summer service term in northern Saskatchewan, Canada. It was here where he worked with Aboriginal native gardening projects to organize and supervise the idea of gardening to stimulate interest with the local people.

Daryl's next assignment took him to Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, to work with the young offender program. Here

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the men were in open custody, training for release to the job market. They learned the details of raising cows, sheep, pigs, and chickens. Coming from farm background, Daryl was the right one for this position.

His voluntary service continued following his time in Canada, when he came to Akron and began his truck driving service.

Daryl began coming to AMC in 1994 and has been actively involved in the life of our church community. He sings in the men's choir, serves as usher, trustee, and was an advisor with MYF for five years.

House Church is an important part of Daryl's life. The group has expanded to fit the needs of everyone. They all enjoy food and supper club is one way to describe this close-knit group who enjoy each other's company.

Daryl likes to cook and he continues his mother's traditional recipes for Funny Cake as well as Shoofly pie.

Daryl shares his signature coffee roast with eager clientele, and donates jars of it each year for the MYF auction. His unique method of roasting offers a worthwhile tour of his kitchen. He estimates that he has worn out eight roasters in these fifteen years! Daryl gets coffee from about twenty-five countries and roasts twenty pounds a month, serving twenty-five gourmet customers.

The coffee connection began when his sister was living in Americas, Georgia. She worked at the local coffee shop and shared the coffee secret with her family back home.

Daryl keeps many ties with MCC. Through the years he has participated in orientation for the International Voluntary Exchange Program, becoming friends with the young adults. He stays in touch after they are back in their country. The connections are far reaching as he visited Cambodia, Indonesia and Laos over the past years. Last year he had the privilege of attending the wedding of an IVEP woman in Indonesia where he was given royal treatment.

His other ongoing connection with MCC is his attendance at four or five relief sales each year, including Virginia, Kansas, and Ontario.

Daryl has been driving truck with Ten Thousand Villages since 1994. He goes to ports in Philadelphia, and now mainly to Baltimore. In addition he delivers to most of the company stores from the East coast to mid-west.

Daryl's plan is to finish his career at TTV in the next five years. Then he can travel more and keep the connections he has made all through the years.

Daryl enjoys Blue Grass music, singing, biking, and playing Ultimate Frisbee. The Frisbee group is a free for all that meets to play for fun. It is similar to soccer, but you pass a Frisbee to teammates instead of a ball.

Daryl has enjoyed worshipping at AMC for more than twenty years. He has developed rich friendships here and values the connections that will continue to grow. He has shared his gifts in many ways, and he reaps the benefits of making important connections throughout all of this time.

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#### Pastor's Perspective: Scattered People and White Doves



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This summer we are invited to participate in two practices to help us remember God's presence in the world and the opportunity to join in God's work in the world.

On Pentecost Sunday, we claimed God's gift of the Holy Spirit sending us into the world.

"The disciples had gathered at Pentecost, the Jewish holiday commemorating God's giving of the Torah to the liberated Hebrew slaves. The giving of the Law was always described as a gift – the gift of the Law – and it was a gift that was to set the people apart, to distinguish them from the nations around them.

Pentecost was a time of receiving a new gift, but this gift, the gift of the Spirit, was not something that set them apart. It was a gift that connected them with others, turned them outward, and scattered them. This gift would scatter them to Jerusalem, the center of their deeply held faith tradition. This gift would scatter them throughout Judea to the poor, the captives, the blind and the oppressed...to those on the margin of society. This gift would scatter

them to Samaria, into the homes of their enemies, those they had long despised. This gift would scatter them to the ends of the earth, for this gift of God cannot be contained.

The Holy Spirit had come with sending power, the power to scatter the community to the ends of the earth."

On Pentecost Sunday, we named that we too are a scattered people, which is good and right. So we were invited to carry white doves with us...in our date books, in our phones, or post them in our homes...reminding us that God's Spirit is sending us into the world and God's spirit goes with us into the world. We are invited to write on the doves where we have been or, if we are unable to travel, to name the people with whom we have interacted or for whom we have prayed. On September 10 we would like to gather the doves into an artistic display representing God's presence in the world. Doves are available on the literature table outside the sanctuary if you never received a dove, have lost your dove or want another one to send to someone or for any other reason.

On Pentecost Sunday, we were also invited to send pictures of ourselves to Karyn Nancarvis

(knancarvis@akronmench.org) on Sundays when we are not gathering with the worshipping group at the physical location of Akron Mennonite Church. This practice is not meant to keep tabs on people. Rather, it is a reminder that the church is not the church in just one physical location but the church is actually the church *when* it is sent out. This practice is not to brag about where we have been or to draw attention to ourselves, but to rejoice in God's Spirit among us and in world.

One person within our congregation asked, "You have helped us remember that we are sent. Will you help us to ask what we should say or do when we get there?" As we travel, meet other people, and go to meetings, jobs and appointments, may we speak and act upon the Good News of Jesus:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recover of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

May we go with the power of the Holy Spirit into God's world to be God's people.


